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

The art of dialogue

Openness to the other (requires reflection on the self; understanding how prejudices are formed; confident in own identity) – first there must be a dialogue with the self..!


How to dialogue effectively:

- Deep listening
- Clear explanation/ articulation
- No distractions (Need to focus and engage directly with 'the other')
- Responding (to deepen understanding; asking the right questions; showing empathy; finding similarities and difference)
- Reflecting (what have I learned through this encounter about myself and about the other?)

Friere: not the job of the teacher to fill students up with knowledge but to empower students to lead their own learning; students need to bring their own experiences into their learning.

Buber: shift in relationship between teacher and learner; students must reflect on what shapes their perceptions of others and how to suspend these judgments in favour of openness and empathy.

Gulen: dialogue should be action-orientated; focused towards community building and peace.
